### **It's Easy To Save**



You pay no income tax on your pretax contributions — or on your investment earnings — until you withdraw money from the plan. This tax deferral can help your retirement savings grow by allowing you to keep all your contributions and earnings invested.

### **A Little Bit Every Week**

Over time, regular contributions to your retirement savings plan can add up significantly.
